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What are modals?

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Modals qualify verbs. Here's a list of commonly spoken modals:

can / could	I can try to call her after I get home.
	He couldn't imagine why she came.
may / might	You may leave.
	We may need to buy some more flour.
	I might buy some fruit on my way home.
should	We should visit her before her operation.
ought to	You really ought to tell the police what you saw.
had better	You had better apologize to her, today!
will / would	I will make a salad for the party.
	Would you pick up a few things for me at the store?
have to	Do I have to?
used to	We used to go swimming at Cass Lake in the summer.

We're going to practice using the modals shown above in **boldface**.

### What Is the Grammar of Modal Usage?

Modals follow this pattern:

#### ..<modal> <base form of the verb>... Where: "<base form of the verb>" is... ...the infinitive, *without* the particle, "to". For example: being To **go** ("I <u>might</u> **go**.") was/were • am/are/is To get ("I should get a better job.") infinitive→ to be To **pay** ("You'<u>d better</u> **pay** him back!") To **be** ("We should **be** happy that he's coming.")

### Here's a Very Important Fact about Modals:

- All morphemes vanish (disappear) when qualified with a modal:
  - He goes to Taipei every weekend.  $\rightarrow$  He should go to Taipei...
  - $\circ$  I had gone to Taipei.  $\rightarrow$  I should have gone to Taipei!

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Examples:

- Ought to
  - o "The Philippines ought to apologize to Taiwan."
  - "That restaurant ought to have special parking for the <u>disabled</u>."



- o "He ought to visit his family for the Moon Festival."
- Should
  - o "I should have known not to speak with him about this."
  - o "When should we send the invitations?"
  - "Why **should** they care about our problems?"
- Had better
  - "You'd better see a doctor about that!"
  - o "I'd better go right now and talk to her."
  - o "This movie had better be good! If it's boring, I'm going to kill you!"

# Some Important Modals

## Examples:

- May
  - Permission
    - "May I come in?"
    - "You may email me your school paper, if you wish."
  - o Possibility
    - "I may stay home today." [present]
    - "He may come to the party; he'll call, first." [future]
    - "He may have come to the party; I didn't see him, personally." [past]
- Might (Possibility, ONLY)
  - "I might stay home today." [present]
  - "He might come to the party; he'll call, first." [future]
  - "He might have come to the party; I didn't see him, personally." [past]

Some Important Modals

- Have to
  - "I have to go see my father today." [present]
  - "He had to get some special tests at the hospital." [past]
  - "If you want to get into a good university, you'll have to study harder and get better grades, now." [future—see 'will'?]
